

Whiteleaf Walks

Walks likely to be suitable for people with impaired mobility and users of wheelchairs, mobility scooters and pushchairs



Whiteleaf Hill and Brush Hill nature reserves are both areas of woodland and downland on top of the Chilterns escarpment with amazing views and archaeological features. Brush Hill is full of wildlife - at different times of the year you may see birds, butterflies, bluebells, fungi and wildflowers. There is car parking at Whiteleaf Hill and the entrance to Brush Hill nature reserve is directly opposite.

Path Information

At both sites there are firm paths through woodland which lead to firm grassy areas with viewpoints. (nb. Grass may be soft and muddy when wet)

- The Whiteleaf walk is about $\frac{3}{4}$ mile there and back
- The Brush Hill walk is a $\frac{1}{2}$ mile circular walk

Visitor Information

- Open from dawn until dusk.
- Nearest public/disabled toilets and refreshments in Horns Lane car park, Princes Risborough (2 miles away).

Brush Hill

- A radar key is needed for the kissing gate at the entrance of the reserve and one other leading to the viewpoint. These are available at Princes Risborough Information Centre. Call 01844 274795.

How to get there



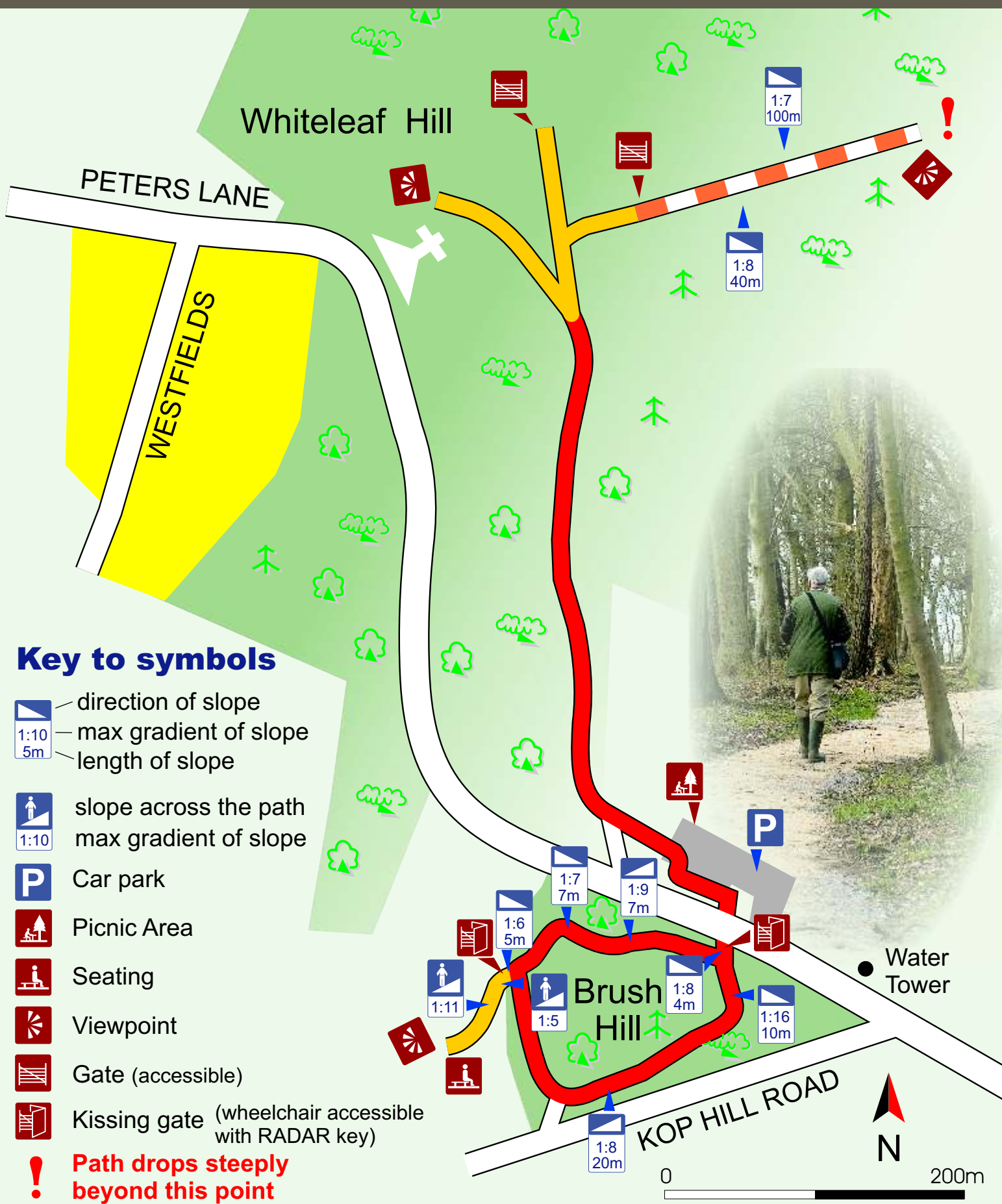
In Monks Risborough turn off the A4010 signposted to Whiteleaf and follow the road to the top of the steep hill (there are brown signs). The car park for both nature reserves is on the left hand side.

Path surfaces

- Hard path, bumpy in places with some loose stones up to 20 mm
- Short grass path. Firm but uneven.
- Natural earth path. Firm but uneven with many tree roots or loose stones up to 30 mm.
