

Watlington Hill

Walks likely to be suitable for people with impaired mobility and users of wheelchairs, mobility scooters and pushchairs



Watlington Hill is a magnificent area of chalk downland perched high above Watlington and a good place to see red kites. The 250 metre long path takes you from the car park through the woods to the edge of the chalk downland.

Path Information

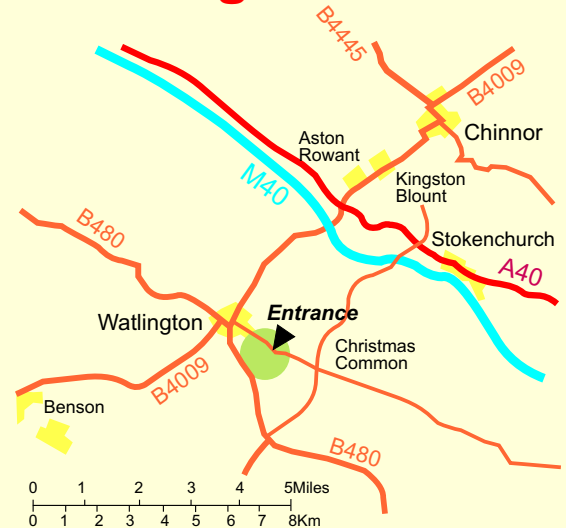
There is a firm path from the car park taking you through the woodland to the edge of the chalk grassland. The average gradient is 1:18. Maximum gradient 1:10 for about 10 metres.

There is a wheelchair accessible kissing gate taking you from the end of the access path on to the chalk downland. The ground beyond the gate is uneven, with a steep gradient and crossfall. There are plans to extend the access path in the future to allow easier access on to the chalk downland with its spectacular views.

Visitor Information

- Open from dawn to dusk.
- Free car parking for about 20 vehicles.
- Nearest public/disabled toilets and refreshments in Watlington (1 mile away). There is a wheelchair accessible toilet at the Fox and Hounds pub in Christmas Common (¼ mile away).

From Watlington take the minor road up Watlington Hill, the car park is on the right hand side near the top of the hill (there is a brown sign).

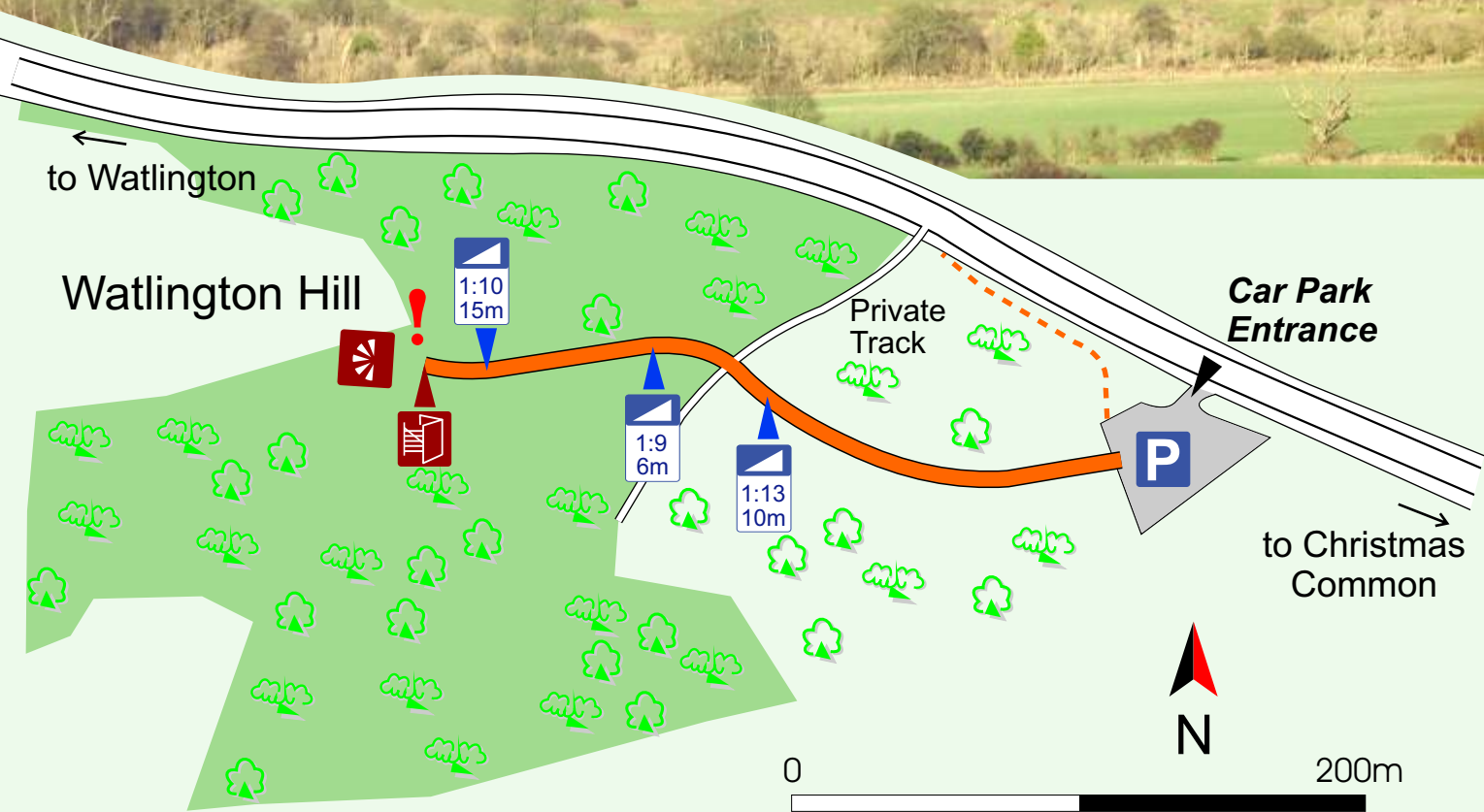
